Celebrating the First Fruits of Freedom

Lammas Day or Gwyl Awst is celebrated on 1st August (in the Northern Hemisphere!). It corresponds to the Hebrew Feast of Weeks, when a sheaf of the first barley harvest was offered in thanksgiving to God for the start of the harvest.

In the medieval church, a loaf of bread baked with flour from the first ripe grains harvested, would be brought into church and blessed as a sign of thanks for God's blessing and provision. Prior to the harvest, stocks of grain would have been running very low, so Lammastide was a time for celebration whilst waiting for the right weather to get everything safely harvested and stored away for the coming year.

Last year, the end of July saw our first worship service in St Cadfan's Church since the beginning of the first lockdown. Since then, we have been able to build up a pattern of services across all our main churches.

Now there are more freedoms for people to meet outdoors and

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indoors, and there is great joy and celebration at being able to socialise with family and friends in these ways, as we have felt starved of those connections and interactions.

Lammastide is therefore a time for us to give thanks for God's provision in many different ways during the difficult times caused by the pandemic, to rejoice in the freedoms we have now been given, and to respect the fact that, whilst the vaccine is still being rolled out in the UK and the wider world, and cases are rising again, there is still some waiting to be done before we can celebrate all the freedoms we used to enjoy.

Reflections on Pilgrimage

As we engage with the diocesan Llan project to develop St Cadfan's as a Pilgrimage Centre, and look afresh at how to engage people with the history and stories of our church buildings, and the faith they witness to, our newsletters this year will each contain a reflection on the theme of pilgrimage.

This month, Paul Inman and Sue Whitehouse, both on our Ministry Team, write of their trips to Taizé, a place that focuses on teaching young people about how to bring peace in their communities, and whose music is sung and appreciated across the world.

Paul Inman:

Taizé is a monastic community founded by the late Brother Roger in 1940 in response to the defeat of France in WWII, as a sanctuary for war refugees. It is situated near Cluny in Burgundy, France. After the war it became a place of pilgrimage, predominantly for younger adults.

Taizé has an ethos of elemental Christian ecumenism. The spirituality it projects is true to the core of the Christian gospel and gives little cognisance to the divisions that exist within the wider Christian church.

The liturgy used is extremely simple, and interspersed with beautifully sung chants.

The Church of the Reconciliation is a simple spacious building with a minimum of furniture. Most pilgrims sit cross-legged on the floor, or use prayer stools.

A visit to Taizé lasts a week, Sunday to Sunday, during which pilgrims are guided through a Holy Week experience. Days are spent with periods of study and singing practice framed by regular worship and prayer in the church. The week takes you through the story of the Passion of Christ and reaches a climax in the Eucharist on Sunday at the end of your visit.

My own visit to Taizé was in 1986. As a young family we were lodged in a farmhouse and formed an extended family with other families for

the week. This enabled most of the adults to attend the worship whilst those remaining would lead a simplified worship for the children.

Time in the church is a very special experience. People gather in silent preparation long before a service. Candles, possibly a little incense, a few icons and some gentle chanting help one to 'centre down'. The brothers scatter themselves throughout the space.

One lasting memory is of seeing Br Roger coming in and gently touching the shoulder of any of his confrères that he was passing close to. A simple but enormously significant act of compassion and support.

Pilgrimages often end at a destination. True, at that time, Taizé was our destination, but it became very much a starting point for me. The transformational nature of the experience has stayed with me ever since, as has an icon of Christ and His Friend which I bought there (pictured Right). The image reminds me of the continuing presence of Christ and that we are his eyes and ears in the world today.

Enormous numbers of young people continue to travel to Taizé every year, and have been for fifty years or so. The total number of people it has touched over the years is vast, so much so that you will find them in churches almost everywhere.

I would contend that Taizé has, in its quiet way, been one of the most significant models for Christian ecumenism in Europe in the present day.

Sue Whitehouse:

I visited Taizé in 1998, with a mixedage group consisting of students and staff from Keele university with several others who were annual pilgrims. We were already enthusiasts for the music and style of worship offered, as Keele was a pioneer of ecumenism.

We found a variety of accommodation available! A lodge for the less able, our own tents for some of us, and the students slept on what looked like warehouse shelves.

Feeding us all was a major undertaking, with surplus (stale) French bread and soup ingredients delivered daily from Cluny. Definitely monastic-type provisions...or

privations...but I know of former pilgrims who actually bought vividly coloured plastic bowls and plates to recreate the experience later.

The wonderful thing about Taizé is its international appeal. I met people from at least twenty other nations, and heard a dozen or more languages sung simultaneously. The chants are designed to work with as many as possible, though there's always Latin as well...ubi caritas et amor, Deus ibi est (where there's love and charity, God is there).

There are Taizé meetings for young folk at least once a year (pre covid) in various cities across the world to keep the community vibrant.

At Taizé itself, there's something incredibly moving about sitting in largely silent prayer with four or five thousand other people, watching the tiny flames of hundreds of tea-light candles gathering our prayers together. I still call them Taizé lamps.

Brother Roger, a Swiss man who sheltered Jewish refugees during the Nazi persecution, started something truly amazing. His tragic murder by a mentally ill pilgrim has not stopped the existence or work of this remarkable community.

A Warm Welcome to all our Visitors! Well, the start of the summer holidays has certainly seen a more than warm welcome to our visitors with lots of sunshine and unusually high temperatures. With foreign holidays curtailed, and some relaxation of regulations, visitor numbers are already high.

This is good news for our businesses, but sometimes challenging for many who are still feeling cautious about the pandemic situation.

As everyone looks for time and space to be refreshed after such a difficult time, we have the privilege of providing a warm welcome in our churches and communities, whatever the weather may do in the meantime!

The new Welsh government regulations (17th July) require places of worship to continue with current practices in our buildings – masks, social distancing, hand sanitising, and good cleaning protocols.

However, tea, coffee, and refreshments may now be served after services subject to an updated risk assessment based on set guidelines. At the time of writing (18th July), we are waiting for the Church in Wales revised guidelines to be published. These will then be updated again with the additional changes due to come in on 7th August.

However, with rising case rates, caution is advised, so just because we can do something, doesn't mean we should, or have to. It will be different for each church and community.

Making God too Small

When looking up something on the internet I came across this quote from Bishop Clive Handford who was Bishop of Warwick, then Bishop in Cyprus and the Gulf and then Presiding Bishop of Jerusalem and the Middle East (whilst still being Bishop of Cyprus and the Gulf).

Celia and I know Bishop Clive well and he presided at the Eucharist at St. Cadfan's once at our invitation.

He said:

'Narrow fundamentalists are almost enough to make me not be a Christian. Theirs is such a tiny God. I hate it when ordinary people are trampled over - when people act and talk as though they have got it all sewn up and have God in their pocket.'

It reminds me of the title of a book written many years ago by J.B. Phillips. It was 'Your God is too small.'

A Thought Provoker about the Future

I was having a 'sort out' of paperwork recently and found a cutting from 'The Times', dated 8th May 2008, headed 'Churchgoing on its knees as Christianity falls out of favour.'

It said that, within a generation,

- the Church of England, (and the Church in Wales), the Roman Catholic Church and other denominations would become financially unviable
- •the number of actively religious Muslims would have increased by almost a million
- •Hindus would come close to outnumbering churchgoers within a generation
- •Christianity was becoming a minority religion
- •The crisis was particularly acute for Methodists and Presbyterians
- •By 2050 there would only be 3,600 churchgoing Methodists in Britain, Anglicans would be down to 87,000, Catholics to 101,700, Presbyterians to 4,400, Baptists to 123,000 and Independents to 168,000
- •By 2030 there would be just 350,000 people attending 10,000 Anglican churches. i.e. an average of 35 each
- •By 2040 there would be only 180,000 worshippers in 6,000 churches an average of 30.

I have to say that, at the time, the Church of England disputed these forecasts – as one would expect – but surely they must give Christians of all denominations food for thought.

In my two periods as Area Dean I had to deal with the closure of some churches in the deanery and I am sorry to say that the most common response when the question of a church's viability was raised was 'it will see me out — the future is someone else's problem.'

In my lifetime there have been very many major changes in life generally and we can all think of examples. I suspect that the biggest changes have been in the use of computers and mobile phones and there are undoubtedly many others.

The COVID 19 pandemic has forced us to change many aspects of our lives including the use of ZOOM for all sorts of meetings, church services and contacting and talking to our families to mention just a few examples.

Our grandchildren 'live on their computers'. I don't like that but, like King Canute, I will not be able to stop the tide. I mention just 2 examples our older grandson is in his 2nd year at University and, since March last year, he has had all his teaching and facetime with tutors on line and he submits his work on line. We now have regular ZOOM meetings with Celia's relations who live in Texas and we even took

part in her nephew's funeral service in Texas via Zoom.

Whether we like it or not, Zoom has been a great blessing in many ways. One thing is absolutely certain, we have to live and minister in the world AS IT IS, not as we would like it to be and that is true of all aspects of our lives not just of the Church.

The situation has worsened since the article was written in 2008. I think one thing is certain, we cannot 'fiddle while Rome burns' and hope that it is all going to go away when the Coronavirus pandemic is eventually overcome so that everything will just revert to 'normal'.

It won't – we need to recognise that the 'genie is now well and truly out of the bottle.'


The dusty attic spider-clad, He, through the keyhole, maketh glad; And through the broken edge of tiles, Into the laddered hay-loft smiles.
